Love Notes...

From Pastor Jean

Do you know what your basic outlook on life is? Are you a "half empty" or "half full" person?

A couple of years ago, I read a meditation that made the claim that there was no such thing as a "half empty" or even "empty" glass, because besides whatever liquid is supposed to be in the glass, there is also air in the glass. So all glasses are always full!

How do you react to that notion? Do you get a little thrill, like, "Oh, wow, I didn't even *think* about the air – that is so cool." Or do you think, "We're talking about the liquid – don't be such a smartie."

Researchers now claim that each individual has a default position, and no matter what occurs, deviations from that position don't last long. In his book *The Happiness Hypothesis*, Jonathan Haidt writes that within a year of major life-altering experiences, whether it be winning a lottery or being rendered a paraplegic in an accident, people have, on average, returned most of the way to their baseline levels of happiness. The optimistic find cause to stay upbeat, and the pessimistic find cause to stay down.

That makes me think about telling the story of Jesus' passion. Whatever your basic outlook on life is will affect the way you receive the story and the way you retell it to others. That kind of makes it a challenge. If an optimist tells the story to a pessimist. . . well, it's not hard to imagine the vast opportunity for misunderstanding.

Although, it's not so much misunderstanding as it is differently understanding. Fred Rogers once made the wise claim that the space between one's mouth and another's ears is sacred space. It's the place where the storyteller has to let go of the message and gift it to the hearer and the place where the hearer can receive or reject and, if the story is received, it settles into the hearer's default position!

It almost makes it essential such a story as Christ's passion be told in love. We have to let go of the facts and delight in the effect it makes on the heart and mind of the hearer. Whatever that effect is. They don't have to get the story right; they have a chance to get the story for them.

Maybe I'm over anticipating the fantastic opportunity I get to preach on the scriptures this month. The Lectionary assigns great stuff: March 1: God sends a flood that kills every human in the whole world except for one family, and the Spirit driving Jesus into the wilderness to be tested by beasts and angels. March 8: God calls Abraham to be the father of many nations, and Jesus calls Peter "Satan." March 15: God gives the Commandments, and Jesus takes whip and ire to the moneychangers. March 22: oh, really great stuff – Moses and the poisonous serpents – believe or die! March 29: that wonderful passage in Jeremiah about God circumcising our hearts, so that we can let the sacred stories in and let them dwell in our default demeanor.

I'll try my best to make each sermon a gift worth giving, and I can't be more thankful for the congregation that I get to gift each sermon to!

But mainly because we welcomed her openly, were attentive, and made her feel at home . . . in Astrid's words, "...more so than any other church." So you see . . .a friendly greeting goes a long way toward lasting relationships!

A Little Bit of Catechism: A Few Words from Luther*

(....because the *Catechism* isn't just for kids!)

In view of the recent headlines about Bernard Madoff's \$50 billion dollar Ponzi scheme and the \$8 billion fraudulent certificate of deposit scheme orchestrated by Texas financier Robert Stanford, it seemed to me that this month might be a fine time to take a look at what Luther has to say about the 7th commandment: "You are not to steal." While it is easy to recognize that massive fraud, like that orchestrated by Mr. Madoff and Mr. Stanford, constitutes a gross violation of God's commandment not to steal, Luther's teachings on the subject remind us to pay just as much attention to what goes on in our own backyard!

Luther reminds us that "to steal is nothing else than to acquire someone else's property by unjust means. These few words include taking advantage of our neighbors in any sort of dealings that result in loss to them," and this applies not only to those who rob someone's safe or pick their pocket, but also to those who cheat others with defective merchandise and shady dealings or waste resources or damage property of neighbors or employers through laziness or malice, and *especially* applies to those who take advantage of the poor. It is not too hard to imagine Luther making his comments in our own time and place: "Stealing is a widespread, common vice, but people pay so little attention to it that the matter is entirely out of hand. As a result, if we were to hang every thief on the gallows, especially those who do not admit it, the world would soon be empty and there would be a shortage of both hangmen and gallows." Quite a vivid turn of phrase to be sure, but not one that paints a very pretty picture of human nature! Luther goes on to assure us that:

"no stolen or ill-gotten possession thrives....no matter how much you steal, be certain that twice as much will be stolen from you. Anyone who robs and takes things by violence and dishonesty must put up with someone else who plays the same game. Because everyone robs and steals from everyone else, God has mastered the art of punishing one thief by means of another. Otherwise, where would we find enough gallows and ropes?"

Gallows and ropes notwithstanding, Luther's second to last word is a bit more positive: "Here you have a rich Lord, who is surely sufficient for your needs and will let you lack or want for nothing. Thus with a happy conscience you can enjoy a hundred times more than you could scrape together by perfidy and injustice." If you are curious about Luther's final word on the subject, I'll leave you to look it up yourself!

Council Notes about Special Offerings for 2009

- New Project added for Memorial Funds: A few years ago, the TLC Council created the current Memorial Fund, designating three special projects—(1) a large patio, (2) stained glass for the sanctuary cross window, and (3) a memorial garden—as options for individuals and families who want to donate to the church in honor of, or in memory of, their loved ones. As you probably are aware, we have recently been able to complete the patio project! With the patio completed, and noting the need for eventual replacement of our sanctuary chairs, which are becoming worn and stained, the Council has voted to replace the patio fund category with a new project fund: new chairs for the sanctuary. In addition to memorials, contributions to any of the three memorial fund projects may also be made at any time for any reason.
- Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas Special Offerings: Each year our offering envelope sets include special "extra" envelopes for Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas, and TLC's usual practice is to designate these offerings for special purposes beyond the general fund. The Council has designated this year's offerings as follows:
 - ◆ Easter Offering: Our Easter Offering will go to the newly designated Sanctuary Chair Memorial Fund. The Council plans to apply for supplemental funds for this offering from Thrivent's Care in Congregations program.
 - ◆ Thanksgiving Offering: This year's Thanksgiving Offering will go toward Mortgage Reduction.
 - ♦ Christmas Offering: This year's Christmas Offering will once again be designated for Lutheran Social Services of Northern California.



I Can Help in the Next Six Months

In the Middle of January the Stewardship Committee passed out "I Can Help in the Next Six Months" time and talent sheets. Almost 40 people turned in one of those sheets on that very day! What a wonderful response. It shows how much we love and support TLC!

Sixteen or more people said that would like to sing in a choir - lots of folks said they would like to make soup - many folks said they would help with outreach stuff (sending mailings, being greeters, etc.), some folks said they would clean the kitchen, classrooms and nursery, and some will plan events for families. Other Witnesses About Christ

There is much historical evidence, besides the Bible, that Jesus did indeed live and that his life, death and resurrection were the foundation of Christianity.

One famous non-Christian historian named Flavius Josephus lived about A.D. 37. He focused primarily on Jewish history but also wrote the following words: "Now there was about this time, Jesus, a wise man ... a doer of wonderful works. He drew over to him both many of the Jews and many of the Gentiles."

The writings of Josephus provide important extra-biblical information about the people, customs and geography during Jesus' time. Origen, a Christian author who wrote around the year 240, said Josephus "did not accept Jesus as Christ." But by mentioning Jesus in his history texts, Josephus added credibility to the Lord's earthly life.
